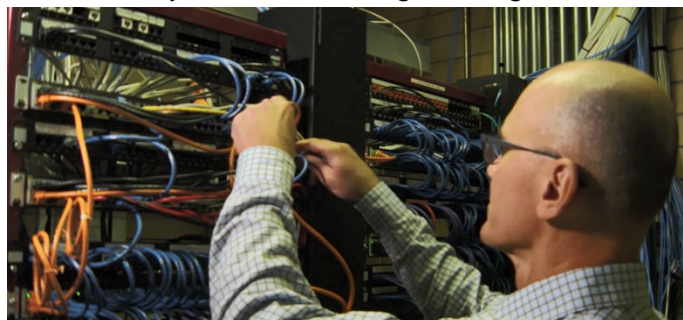




Information About Dual Credit Computer Network Specialist Courses From Northern Lakes College

Why take dual credit Computer Network Specialist courses?

1. Earn up to 55 credits toward your high school diploma.
2. Lower your workload in College. Taking college courses while in high school will reduce the number of courses required to finish your certificate.
3. Find out if the Computer Network Specialist program interests you before enrolling in College.
4. By completing the entire program, you are ready to start your career right out of high school.
5. Save money. Your high school may cover some costs. Check with your school to determine if they cover any expenses.
6. Qualify for a \$500 tuition bursary. Dual credit students who successfully complete qualify for tuition bursary if they continue their post-secondary education with Northern Lakes College.



Where is the program available?

The Computer Network Specialist Program is available at any location.

When is the program available?

1. Term 1 – Sept. 3 to Dec. 11, 2024
2. Term 2 – Jan. 6 to Apr. 18, 2025
3. Term 3 – May 1 to June 25, 2025
4. Most classes are available Live online or can be worked on at any time from any location. If the live online classes do not fit your high school schedule, you can listen to the recordings and do the work at a time that works for you.

What prerequisites are needed to get into the program?

1. To start the program, Students must have or be registered in English 30-1 or 30-2 and Math 20-1 or 20-2.
2. Students require English 30-1 (50%) or 30-2 (65%) to take ENGL1110.

How difficult is the program?

1. The courses in this program are at a college level and, therefore, require a significant commitment on behalf of the student, the parent, the high school and the College. Consequently, you must be sure you are ready to dedicate yourself to the courses before applying.
2. Parents are encouraged to stay informed of their child's progress in the program via the high school.

Other things you need to know:

1. For the Computer Network Specialist courses, students will follow the schedule laid out by the College, which may differ from the high school schedule. The schedule will be provided when you start the program.
2. The program has eleven courses; students can take as many courses as they would like by dual credit. Once students have completed all eleven courses, they will qualify for a Computer Network Specialist certificate.

5. The CNET0100 Employment Practicum course requires students to work in a workplace. In some cases, students may be able to work at home to do projects for companies to meet the practicum requirement.
